Dear Friends

On 6th January we celebrate Epiphany and the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus. Who were these Wise Men?

No one knows for sure. Matthew calls them 'Magi'.

That was the name of an ancient caste of a priestly kind from Persia. It wasn't until the third century that they were called kings - by a church father, Tertullian.

Another church father, Origin, assumed there were three - to correspond with the gifts given.

Later Christian interpretation came to understand gold as a symbol of wisdom and wealth, incense as a symbol of worship and sacrifice, and myrrh as a symbol of healing – and even embalming.

Certainly Jesus challenged and set aright the way in which the world handled all three of these things.

Since the 8th century, the Magi have had the names Balthasar, Caspar and Melchior.

Central to the story of the Magi is their determination to worship the King. They travelled many miles from afar so to do. For sure there would have been rough terrain and desert to be crossed. However, there was a star to guide

them!

So too amidst a year which will have its dark moments - the light of the world will shine for us!

Significant also in the magi story is their willingness to change their journey after their encounter and worship of the infant King.

The Magi knew that to return to King Herod would be unwise! Having worshipped the child -things couldn't be the same!

Though this seems a dark time in our world, as we journey through 2025 I pray that Jesus' promises and presence will direct our journeys - particularly through the rough terrain and desert we must expect to encounter.

December is always a busy time working with our local schools - among the highlights were: 3 Nativity rehearsals and 3 performances by Alloway Primary School; a Nativity performance by Fisherton Primary School; Christmas assemblies at Maidens Primary and Fisherton Primary; two Christmas services at Doonfoot Primary School and a Church Christmas Service for Alloway Primary School. A HUGE thanks to the 'technical team' for their help with these events. I am looking forward to what 2025 has in store!



January 25th Feast Day of St Paul

January is a month of the beginning of great things! As well as the naming of the Son of God, we celebrate the conversion of the greatest ever apostle of the Christian faith. Many books have been written on Paul, and here is the briefest of introductions.

He was a Jew, born as 'Saul' at Tarsus, and brought up by the Rabbi Gamaliel as a Pharisee. A devout, fanatical Jew, Saul persecuted the Christians, and watched with satisfaction the first Christian martyrdom, the stoning of Stephen. Then, on his way to Damascus, Saul had a vision of Christ that stopped him in his tracks. He realised that this Jesus whom he was persecuting was in fact the Messiah for whom he had longed.

Saul changed overnight. He was given a new name, Paul, and became an evangelist for the cause of Christ. He became a leader in the early Church, and his special calling was as an apostle to the Gentiles. He wrote epistles to the young churches that he founded and thus, inadvertently, wrote a great part of the New Testament.

Life as the greatest apostle was hardly full of perks: Paul was stoned, beaten, mobbed, homeless, hated, imprisoned, and finally martyred. Tradition has it that he was beheaded in Rome during the persecution of Nero in 64 AD and buried where the Basilica of St Paul 'outside the walls' now stands. His mighty faith in Christ has kindled similar belief in many hundreds of millions of people down the centuries.





Alloway and Fisherton

At the November meeting of the Kirk Session the clerk was instructed by a majority of elders to write the required letter to Presbytery to give effect to the Basis of Union concerning the sale of the Fisherton building before September 2025.

The timing of the sale of the building had already been agreed and voted on by the two Kirk sessions and two congregations.

This was an integral part of the basis of union and part of the Presbytery Mission Plan voted on last year.

The guidelines for buildings categorised B in Presbytery Mission plans indicate Kirk Sessions should allow 6-9 months for the disposal of the property.

The guidelines also encourage that until the point of sale, services within a B listed church should continue.

Thus, with September 25 being nine months away, the Kirk Session with a heavy heart, agreed to send the letter.

In the interim, fabric repairs required keeping the Fisherton building wind and watertight and safe are ongoing.

The General Trustees, given the volume of church sales are indicating caution in meeting the closure timetables of all presbyteries.

In truth, as the year begins we cannot therefore predict exactly when the Fisherton building will close.

Until further notice we warmly encourage those who so wish to join us at Sunday Service at Fisherton at 9.30pm.

At the session too, the difficulties of re-siting worship into Dunure village were fully discussed.

In talks it transpired the presbytery committee had not necessarily expected that a weekly Sunday service take place in the village.

Given the condition of some local premises, the Kirk Session committee set up to explore the matter agreed unanimously that at this moment there are no suitable local venues available.

We did note with interest the talk of a future village heritage centre. Plans for this presently are at the very earliest of stages.

Nevertheless, the session seeks to remain fully appraised of the changing circumstances of the village.

Over the past summers we have already engaged in innovative worship with our "Sundown Services".

Regardless of when the Fisherton building closes, as a session we will continually seek to develop and deliver new ways of mission and

service in the Alloway and Fisherton Parish which we are privileged to serve.

Session Report

The Session has had three meetings since my last update.

In August we started with a tribute from our Minister to a long serving elder, Ronnie Breingan who died in June. He would be remembered in many ways including as a diligent and faithful elder and as the founder of the 1st Alloway BB Company.

Our treasurer, Lorna, confirmed that our yearly accounts had been agreed by Presbytery and she was pleased to report that our deficit for the year was, currently, less than budgeted. The Property Convenor advised that lots of jobs had been completed including the removal of wasps' nests, water heaters serviced and the bi-folding doors in the Fellowship Lounge repaired. A new boiler had also been fitted in the manse.

Under Stewardship it was agreed that we would have as our theme this year "the year of sharing" and under halls we heard that flowers had been delivered to Jean Kerr as a thank you for all her long service given as our halls convenor. Helen as our Mission Convenor, advised that we would have two Malawi visitors, one from the Guild movement who would speak at our Sunday service and the other a Missionary partner who would speak at Wednesday Worship. The Worship and Development Convenor, Donald, confirmed that 25 people had attended our visit to The David Livingstone Centre and the church opening had again been very successful receiving over 1,000 visitors and raising over £1,000 for our chosen charity, Ayrshire Cancer Care.

From Presbytery we heard that The Moderator of the General Assembly was present at their last meeting and gave an interesting speech. Bill also advised that extra work had been allocated to both himself, now on the Presbytery Review committee, and to David Hume now on the Vacancy committee and also the new Presbytery Representative to North Ayrshire Council.

David then reported on the successful summer holiday club when 37 children joined the fun and he was looking forward to events in September - the Men's club, Pulse and Messy Church.

In October, we again heard our finances were in good order and another legacy of £2,000 had been received. From Property we heard that there were a number of bulbs needing replaced in the Sanctuary and scaffolding was being purchased which would help us to carry out this work. Under Mission we heard that over 120 people attended the harvest supper and £617 was added to the contributions collected from the envelopes for the Vine Trust. Worship and Development told us that we were re-introducing elders' visits to our clubs and organisations. David reported on his school work, where the SU meetings were being well supported and mentioned the success of the toddlers where the attendance was now 50 plus.

We had a very full agenda at our November meeting, the main topic for consideration being the future of the Fisherton church. Firstly, we heard from our various committee representatives on the day to day life within the congregation. Lorna advised that the deficit now showing in the accounts had risen but was still within our budgeted figure. Funds from the Wednesday worship had grown and it was felt that they should be distributed. The court was asked to approve donations of £500 to Blythswood Trust, £500 to the DEC appeal for Sudan and £500 to Crossreach. This was agreed. Agreement was also given to divide the Watchnight service offerings plus the Christmas Day offerings between the DEC appeal for Ukraine and the Middle East and Crosshouse Hospital Maternity care support group.

Donald's property report included the addition of a new smart meter at Fisherton, some roof repair work there with some further work on mortar joints still to be undertaken early next year.

Other items included additional hospitality over the Christmas period, a possible revamp to our halls kitchen, improved audio-visual equipment and an intimation that all the church records had been attested and found to be in order. Dates for the Christmas Fair and New-Year concert were confirmed and the proceeds for the concert agreed as a split between Crossreach and Whiteleys Retreat.

I then advised the court that, in accordance with the will of the Church of Scotland, we would be giving out long service certificates to 18 elders who had given a significant amount of time to the eldership. These would be presented at the morning service on 8th December. We then recorded a number of new members to our roll and it was particularly pleasing to note that 7 of the 11 were by profession of faith.

One of the last items on the agenda was Fisherton and after confirming dates of Christmas services and a review of the roll there, we then discussed the options open to us on the next stage of the Presbytery Mission Plan.

The small review group which was set up to consider this matter reported back confirming that there was little opportunity in Fisherton and Dunure to support a long term place of worship. There was a possible case for a community centre at the church if various alterations were made but no costings were available for this. This led on to a vote where one motion put forward was to continue with the timetable previously given and agreed by both churches and proceed with the sale of Fisherton building. The counter motion asked Presbytery to review their original decision and maintain the Fisherton building as a place of worship.

There was a majority vote in favour of continuing with the Presbytery Mission Plan as agreed.

We sang 'O Little Town of Bethlehem', followed by a game of 'Santa Says'. They had to listen carefully and switch direction passing the parcel every time the words 'Left' or 'Right' were mentioned in the story, which happened a lot!
